Text: Genesis 39 - 40

Introduction

favorite son of a wealthy man. He had everything he wanted and everyone had to do just what he

said. The next day he had nothing. He was a lowly slave with an uncertain future.

Although everything in Joseph's life had changed, God hadn't changed. He was still

The Story

A man named Potiphar bought Joseph. Potiphar was an important man. He was an
